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MINISTER'S MESSAGE

The Simple Life

On our Regional Executive Council's (REC) meeting agenda item 2 is Ongoing Formation. In February the REC chose the book *Eager to Love* by Richard Rohr for the council's Ongoing Formation.

Rohr begins each chapter with a thought provoking quotation. Here is the one he used for his Preface.

"Something Old and Something New"

Yearning for a new way will not produce it.

Only ending the old way can do that.

You cannot hold onto the old, all the while declaring that you want something new.

The old will defy the new;

The old will deny the new;

The old will decry the new.

There is only one way to bring in the new. You must make room for it."

The temptation, after reading those words by Neale Donald Walsch is to put the book aside because "I am not ready for this." Fortunately, members of the REC chose to go beyond the first page and at this June's meeting we were discussing Chapters III and IV. In Chapter III there is a section titled *The Gift of the Simple Life* which summarizes the transformative gifts of 'leaving the world.'

Many of us struggle with our Franciscan call to live simply. Maybe Rohr's summary of the transforming gifts of 'leaving the world', an abridged part of which is presented here, could help clarify what we have professed to be.

"When you agree to live simply you put yourself outside of other's ability to buy you off, reward you falsely, or control you by money, status, salary, punishment, and loss or gain of anything...

When you agree to live simply, you have little to protect and no desire for acquisition, even for acquisition of any 'moral capital.' ...

When you agree to live simply you can understand what Francis meant when he said, 'A brother has not given up all things if he holds onto the purse of his own opinions.' ...

When you voluntarily agree to live simply, you do not need to get into the frenzy of work for the sake of salary or the ability to buy nonessentials or raise your social standing. You enjoy the freedom of '*not climbing*'...

When you agree to live simply, you have *time* for spiritual and corporal works of mercy because you have renegotiated in your mind and heart your very understanding of time and its purposes...

When you agree to live simply, you can easily find a natural solidarity with all people on the edge and the bottom --- the excluded, the shamed, and the

forgotten----because you stop idealizing the climb and finally realize there isn't a top anyway...

When you agree to live simply, you have little energy to 'circle the wagons' around your group, your ethnicity, your country, your money, and your religion...

When you agree to live simply, all the ideological "isms" lose their pull and attraction...

When you agree to live simply, the ethics and economics of war reveal themselves in all their evil and stupidity...

When you agree to live simply, people cease to be possessions and objects for your consumption or use...

When you agree to live simply, there is no long-standing basis for any kind of addiction. You are free to enjoy, but you never let any enjoyment become your master. *You practice non-addiction every day by letting go, not needing, and not desiring anything in particular.* Fasting, detachment, and simplicity were the original words for non-addiction in the spiritual tradition."

The journey into a simple life can begin only when we cease to demand that others change in fundamental ways. We make that journey step by step when we begin to change ourselves.

**FROM THE CONFERENCE OF REGIONAL
SPIRITUAL ASSISTANTS**

Sisters and brothers,

I want to share two thoughts with you: (1) to explain how the CRSA operates, and (2) to make a plea for members to begin spiritual assistant training when the next class starts, so that we can give every local fraternity a spiritual assistant.

The Conference of Regional Spiritual Assistants, like the Regional Executive Council, is here to serve you. The three appointed regional spiritual assistants are Rock DeSpain, Armando Lomeli, and Sylvia Paoli. All three were appointed by all three Provincial Ministers of the first Orders. Dan Abalos has been serving as secretary to the CRSA for some time, and Fr. Steve Gross, OFM Conv., serves as a mentor and adjunct member.

We try to have quarterly meetings with all of the local spiritual assistants in the region. We share issues, have ongoing formation, discuss questions that have arisen, and make plans for future events. A spiritual assistant is part of every Profession. If your fraternity does not have a spiritual assistant, then call one of us and we will arrange for one to be present to assist you. Also, don't forget that when you do final interviews of those in initial formation (1) to move from inquiry into candidacy, and (2) to be professed, you are required by our Constitutions to have a spiritual assistant present as part of the interviewing team. Again, if you do not have one, call us and we will make sure someone is there to assist you.

Despite our efforts over the last ten years, there are still several fraternities without spiritual assistants. On the positive side, however, ten years ago we hardly had *any* local spiritual assistants, and many who were occupying that position were not "suitable and well-prepared." So we have made great strides, but more is needed. We are revamping the spiritual training class. Hopefully we will be able to start again sometime in the fall, and will not meet every month as we have for the past four classes. It will probably be a combination of four or five week-ends over a two-year period of time, with some one-day meetings and/or telephone/Skype, or similar conferences in-between. It is extremely important

for every member of every fraternity to seriously pray and discern about the possibility of training to become a spiritual assistant. It is *our* Order, as we were told in about 2003 by Fr. Michael Higgins, T.O.R., (who just gave a wonderful retreat at Serra), and we must provide our own spiritual assistants, he said, as the friars simply do not have men to provide to us.

So please discuss the need in your councils and fraternities, and pray earnestly about it, asking the Holy Spirit to inspire those brothers and sisters who have the ability, with training, to take on that very important task. The need will never disappear, because several of the local spiritual assistants will not be able to serve even a full 12-year term, due to age, health, etc. There must always be people in training to replace those who have to retire – a category that includes your three regional spiritual assistants.

Perhaps you can have an ongoing formation session on what is involved in being a spiritual assistant, or maybe one of us can even come and make a presentation to your fraternity. But please, let's all pray about it!

Sanctuary Churches

If a mother from Guatemala showed up at your church door with a little kid in her arms and said, "Can you help me?" how would you respond?

There has been a history in California of churches offering sanctuary to undocumented immigrants.

Back in the 1980s, several hundred churches became sanctuary churches, primarily for Salvadorian refugees. Sanctuary churches are exactly that: houses of worship where undocumented people can go who fear deportation by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

Christian leaders across the country are outraged with the recent rise in immigration raids. The Church World Service group for refugees has built a network of sanctuaries for Central Americans targeted by ICE. Check out this creative and courageous way to provide rapid response accompaniment and unarmed civilian protection called "sanctuary in the streets".

The Catholic Legal Immigration Network focuses on legalizing non-legal residents, but that is a process that could take months. What if you already have a deportation notice in hand? It is unofficial ICE policy to avoid entering public schools, hospitals and churches to apprehend people who are in the country illegally. Perhaps that is where we can help.

As the long wait for immigration reform continues, we Franciscans can always find more stable footing in what God teaches us: "You shall treat the alien who resides with you no differently than the natives born among you; you shall love the alien as yourself; for you too were once aliens in the land of Egypt" (Leviticus 19:34).
