Conference of Regional Spiritual Assistants

There were two farmers working in a field when a tourist comes walking down the road. The tourist asks "Habla Español?" The two farmers don't understand and shake their heads. Then the tourist asks "Sprechen Sie Deutsch?" Again the two farmers don't understand and shrug. Finally the tourist asks, "한국어하세요?". They don't understand and the tourist continues sadly on his way. After a while, one farmer says to the other, "Maybe we should learn another language." He answers, "I don't know. That guy spoke three, and it didn't do him any good."

Pentecost, as the name suggests, is 50 days after Easter. There are 40 days of Lent, so why 50 days after Easter do we celebrate Pentecost? While 40 is a number of completeness (Noah was on the boat for 40 days, Moses led Israel Forty years in the desert, Jesus fasted forty days), where do find the number 50 in the history of Israel? It is the day after seven weeks prescribed in Leviticus 23 to separate the big pilgrimage festivals of Passover, Shavot (a harvest festival), and Purim (the festival of booths). It is fifty days (or so) since Passover, so the disciples were together to celebrate the first fruits. What they received instead was the Holy Spirit! So now we celebrate Pentecost 50 days after Easter to celebrate the Holy Spirit in our lives.

I hear in Italy it was customary to scatter rose petals from the ceiling of the churches to recall the miracle of the fiery tongues. In France it was customary to blow trumpets during Divine service, to recall the sound of the mighty wind which accompanied the Descent of the Holy Spirit.

The festival spirit is not as pronounced as it once was, but I hope we can at least feel the warmth of God's love as we reflect on how God has loved us. He forgives us, heals us, he invites us to work with him to bring the good news we have heard.

Elizabeth Kubler-Ross, famous for her work on the stages of dying, has written: "Love is the flame that warms our soul, energizes our spirit and supplies passion to our lives. It's our connection to God and to one another."

We all have different ministries. Many of you are married and have ministries to each other and ministries to your children. There are different works, but the same God who accomplishes all of them. A manifestation of the Spirit is given to each who receives it for the common good. We have many members of the Secular Franciscans, each of them different, but there is only one Body of Christ.

Your profession as a Franciscan is based upon your Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation. You recieved the Holy Spirit, and that has blossomed into your Franciscan vocation. If you have ever been to an ordination, you will hear the words:

"Receive the Gospel of Christ whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach."

These words are not just for ordained folks. They are for everyone who has recieved the Holy Spirit. Everyone you meet, every day of your life, sees something familiar. Yet you are also a Temple of the Holy Spirit. In your presence, others will sense that the presence of something different is among them. Everyone deserves to hear the Gospel in a familiar language. The Holy Spirit makes you into a Holy Book for other people discover the good news. I heard of one enthusiastic preacher who said, "You are so full of the Holy Spirit that if a mosquito bites you, he's gonna fly away singing!"

Don't worry about whether you are good enough. "You don't have to get good to get God, you have to get God to get good." God comes to us. Remember how you came to believe? Remember how we came feel that God truly is our advocate. God could condemn us, yet chooses to heal us. It is like we were falling, and suddenly found ourselves being swept into a protective embrace. It doesn't stop there. God decided to work through us.

Receive the Holy Spirit, whose temple you have become. Believe the power you received, and act on what you believe. He will teach you and remind you of all that Jesus told us. He gives you the power to help others believe that they are forgiven. He gives you the power to connect very different people into the one Body of Christ.

Let us trust the Holy Spirit and become everything he wants us to be. Let us discover a whole new language of love. It is uniquely your language and yet it is universally understood. By being fully the person God calls you to be, you are a part of the body of Christ and have become fully the agent of God's plan in the world!

JPIC: Love the Lord, Love His Kingdom, Love the Earth Here I am, Lord. Send me!

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Not so very long ago I was taking my daily walk. Up ahead of me, close enough to see but too far away to be certain of any details, I saw a person fall off of a bike. Within a second, I saw no fewer than twelve people running toward him from all directions. And, within seconds, he was on his feet, and one could hear the distant sound of the paramedics racing to him.

As I got closer, I could see that he was a young man. But none of the twelve helpers around him could have known that when they ran to him. They did not know if he was male or female, young or old, white, black, Asian, North American, Spanish speaking, English, French, Korean speaking, or any of the many languages we hear around us every day. He was a human down and needing help. They responded. Praise Be to God, he was fine and graciously thanking his helpers all around him. I wept and weep still as I am telling you this story.

God builds this in us, sisters and brothers, I am certain. We see someone in distress, it awakens our hearts, our awakened hearts awaken compassion, and compassion animates us. We act. Sometimes it is a person in distress, sometimes an animal. It is alive to us and reveals the trace or vestige or image of God to us and we act. Is this not the definition of mercy?

Of course, there are characteristics within us that may inhibit this response: responsible selfpreservation, physical limitations, or social pressures. It reminds us of the Parable of the Good Samaritan. Some scholars have offered that the priest and the Levite would have been made ritually unclean and therefore unable to perform their religious duties if they had touched the man by the side of the road and he were dead. Others have suggested that they may have just been in a hurry! It reminded me of another story in which seminarians at a School of Theology were being tested on homiletics. The text was the Parable of the Good Samaritan and they were told if they were late for class they would fail. They did not know they were part of a social experiment and that the fallen person on the side of the path to their classroom was a researcher who later reported that the majority of Seminarians did not stop, despite the almost duplicate facts to the Parable upon which they were about to preach. They told the researcher they did not want to fail their class!

We all have "reasons" for not acting sisters and brothers. But let us be sure our reasons will satisfy our Lord who has sent us to be his disciples. Let us remember the words of our Beloved Saint Francis – "for up to now we have done very little."

Here I am, Lord. Send me.
