Signs in Our Time

from gospel to life and life to the gospel. Where and how does this play out in my daily life? These signs in the front yard tell the story of my journey from gospel to life and life to the gospel.



In 2005, following the recommendations of a home energy audit we (my family) had the attic and the outer walls of the house insulated and upgraded to more efficient heating and air condition units. In 2006 we replaced the front lawn with three fruit trees and a butterfly bush, thus reducing water consumption. If we had waited two years, the city would have paid us to remove the grass. The #7 on the sign indicates that ours was the seventh household in the city of Claremont to have taken those steps in the move towards a more efficient use of our resources.

A twitter hashtag? A slogan? A social movement? Yes. It is all of them.



The movement was founded in 2013 after the acquittal of George Zimmerman in the shooting death of African American teenager Trayvon Martin, February 2012. The purpose of the movement is advocacy and protest against racial discrimination. There is an excellent article on this topic by Carolyn Townes, OFS, National Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) Animator in the current issue of TAU-USA.

Over the summer, I participated in an eight-week course intitled *Racial Healing*. Being steeped in African American History was an enlightening and often gut- wrenching reading experience. Close your eyes. Imagine yourself or watching your children, on an auction block, waiting to be sold.

We continue to see, and for many African Americas live with, the long-term effects of chattel slavery. Consider driving while black, food dessert and redlining. Yes. We do need to be reminded. Black Lives Matter.

In these four yard signs, I see expressed Articles 4 – 19 of the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order.

FRANCISCAN PRAYER

If we want to know how Francis went about rebuilding his life, once he discovered it was not just about rebuilding old churches, we need to look to Clare, who best expressed it when she wrote to Agnes of Prague: Gaze upon Christ, consider Christ, contemplate Christ, imitate Christ. Those words explain contemplation as Franciscans see it. Consider the contrast with the monastic form:

Monastic Focus

- 4. Contemplation
- 3. Prayer
- 2. Meditation
- 1. Reading

Franciscan Focus

- 1. Gaze
- 2. Consider
- 3. Contemplate
- 4. Imitate

The goal of the monk at that time was to gaze upward toward heaven and this upward direction would lead to union with God, so the monk started with reading and worked upwards to contemplation. The goal for the Franciscan, on the other hand, is a penetrating gaze into the ordinary of life. The starting point with us is the Incarnation – God descending to us rather than our ascending to God. Our gaze is upon this Incarnate God as reflected, particularly, in the Crucified Lord. The goal of contemplation for a monk focused on a vision of God that resulted in the ecstatic union. The goal of contemplation for the Franciscan focused on transformation by which one became like the face of God reflected in the Incarnation and tried ultimately to imitate Jesus.

The object of our *gaze* is the crucified Savior who stands before us as a mirror in which we see ourselves. In Franciscan prayer the practice of gazing is critical. It is to pray long but with few words. Too many words can inhibit prayer.

The word <u>consider</u> encompasses the purity of one's focus. In the process of gazing one must center on the one essential thing, attempting to put aside anything that can alter or weaken one's gaze. It is to maintain a single-mindedness, a clear and straightforward focus. One's eyes are kept on Jesus alone.

To <u>contemplate</u> requires a radical shift in thinking. Deep contemplative prayer is not so much learning HOW to contemplate God by some method or practice, as it is becoming aware that it is God who is contemplating us. Contemplation is not what I do, or what I do to God. It is what God does to me through an invitation to intimacy and union. It is true that we want to be with God, but all prayer begins because God wants us! We have to be attentive to God's touch and inspiration. This approach to prayer frees us from the compulsion that somehow we have to make prayer happen. It brings in a simplicity to prayer. Remember, we do not make God "be." God makes us "be."

To <u>imitate</u> does not mean to mimic the behavior of another. When Clare used the term, she was asking Agnes to become the image of the God on whom she gazed. To gaze, consider and contemplate Christ Crucified in the movement I've described leads to transformation - our—goal. When I gaze at the cross, I am looking into a mirror. I see my true self. Imitation is transformation insofar as Christ comes alive in my life. In this transformation, complete union happens.

Thus, when I gaze upon the cross, I no longer see suffering: rather I see open-armed, unconditional, extravagant, self-giving love. I find myself confronted and comforted. This is the only kind of love that can put hatred to rest, that can break the forces of violence and bring us comfort and strength in our sorrow. Each year on Sept. 14th we celebrate the Feast of the Triumph of the Cross. The cross is a triumph because it symbolizes the reality that the power of love has broken, once and for all, the power of self-centeredness, sin and death.

Read 1 Cor. 1:18-19, 22-25, for what might be considered a summary of this. Then consider if you have experienced any of this in your own life.





The Eucharist and JPIC

Like many converts from Protestantism to Catholicism, it was my clear and abiding belief in the real presence of Christ that brought me into the Church now nearly twenty years ago. I was an active Protestant, active in Christian education committees, teaching Sunday and Bible School, serving as lector, enlivening mission projects. But, on Saturday evenings, in my small town in Pennsylvania, I would find myself at St. Elizabeth's Roman Catholic Church, processing with others, to stand before the real presence of my Lord and Savior Jesus. With arms folded, I would receive a blessing, and then kneel to pray through and connect with the powerful currents running through my being. I knew I had received spiritually the true body and blood of our Lord. Finally, then, I entered RCIA and was received into the Church. Then, and now, I can receive Him physically. Praise be to God.

The Eucharist is our most powerful prayer. There we stand before Him humbly and in awe, reflecting on the enduring beauty of this gift of grace given to us by our most merciful and generous Lord. We receive him and rededicate ourselves to never being separated from Him.

By the time you read this, dear sisters and brothers in Christ and in St. Francis, we will have gathered on November 14 to reflect upon the presence of our Lord in the Eucharist, and His unwavering devotion to us, calling us to be unwavering in our faithfulness to Him. We will have prayed through the four-fold pattern of the Eucharist – how our Lord took the bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to His disciples gathered with Him in the upper room. We will have reflected on how we, too, are taken, blessed, broken, and given. For those of you not present, let us reflect together with those who were present on the call of the Eucharist.

We are "taken" at our baptism, and then again at our profession when we commit before God to live the Gospel way of life. We are "blessed." Each of us was created, loved, and called into being by our Lord. Each of us was sent on a mission of love. Our work is to discern that mission for which we were sent, to embrace it, and fulfill it. God gives us the grace to do so. Each of us is "broken." Indeed, we are broken by life. But, for our purposes here, it is instructive to consider what breaks our hearts? The unborn? The homeless? The elderly? The degradation of the environment, the unchecked desire for power that keeps wars raging? The refugees on the planet seeking safety? What breaks our hearts so wide so that the love God has poured into it can be poured out for the sake of the world?

We know we are "given." Our Lord called each of us. St. Francis heard the call and followed. He then called all of us to join him in creating our Order that celebrates 800 years of presence in the world. We are nurtured and sustained by the words of our Beloved Saint Francis, "Who I am before God, that I am and nothing else." Let us pray together to follow Jesus as St. Francis taught us. Let us en-hope each other as we journey forward, praying and working for Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation.
